

# COLUMBIA RIVER JOINT STATE NOTICE

June 7, 2013

The States of Oregon and Washington met today and adopted some recreational fishery seasons. The following reflects the newly adopted seasons:

<i>2013 Mainstem Columbia River Spring Chinook Recreational Fisheries - Recommendation</i>	
<b>Bonneville Dam to Oregon/Washington Border (Zone 6 Area)</b>	
Season:	Saturday June 8 through Saturday June 15, 2013 (8 days)
Area:	Tower Island power lines (approximately 6 miles below The Dalles Dam) upstream to Oregon/Washington border, plus the Oregon and Washington banks between Bonneville Dam and the Tower Island power lines.
Daily Bag Limit:	Two adult salmonids per day, but only one may be a Chinook. Release sockeye. Only adipose fin-clipped fish may be kept. All other permanent regulations apply.
Misc. Regs:	For the mainstem Columbia River salmon and steelhead fishery from the Rocky Point/Tongue Point line upstream to OR/WA border, effective through June 15, it is unlawful when fishing from vessels which are less than 30 feet in length (substantiated by Coast Guard documentation or Marine Board registration) to totally remove from the water any salmon or steelhead required to be released.

<i>2013 Mainstem Columbia River Spring Chinook Recreational Fisheries - Recommendation</i>	
<b>Downstream of Bonneville Dam</b>	
Season:	Saturday June 8 through Saturday June 15, 2013 (8 days)
Area:	Extension of existing fishery to include boat angling from Beacon Rock upstream to the Bonneville Dam boat deadline.
Daily Bag Limit:	Two adult salmonids per day, <b>but only one may be a Chinook</b> . Release sockeye. Only adipose fin-clipped fish may be kept. All other permanent regulations apply.
	For the mainstem Columbia River salmon and steelhead fishery from the Rocky Point/Tongue Point line upstream to OR/WA border, effective through June 15, it is unlawful when fishing from vessels which are less than 30 feet in length (substantiated by Coast Guard documentation or Marine Board registration) to totally remove from the water any salmon or steelhead required to be released.
